Rights Respecting at Brindishe Schools



TÜRKIYE & SYRIA EARTHQUAKES FEB 2023

WHAT HAS HAPPENED?

A massive earthquake struck Türkiye and Syria at around 4 am local time on 6 February. It was 7.8 magnitude, and the epicentre was near Gaziantep in southern Türkiye. Millions of people felt the earthquake, including in Lebanon, Israel, Cyprus, and Egypt. Aftershocks were felt throughout the day, including two further huge earthquakes. Many children have lost their homes and have been separated from their families. Access to clean water is a priority. It is exceptionally cold at this time of year so access to shelter, warm clothing and food are also very important.

WHAT UNICEF DOES IN AN EMERGENCY

In a disaster children may be unable to enjoy all their rights – for instance education, health care. UNICEF works to restore access to these rights as soon as possible.

UNICEF may:

- Help provide access to nutritious food, clean water and health care (Article 24).
- Set up safe spaces to ensure the immediate safety of children, support them to express their feelings, and to protect them from any further harm (Articles 13 and 19).
- Support access to education and children's right to play (Articles 28 and 31)
- Send experts to help reunite children with their families wherever possible. Sometimes that may need to be a relative who isn't the parent or immediate caregiver. UNICEF works to ensure that children can connect with people they know and love (Articles 9 and 10).

WHAT IS UNICEF DOING IN SYRIA & TURKIYE?

In Syria, UNICEF is working to ensure access to clean water, and seeking to secure children's safety and wellbeing. In Türkiye, UNICEF has mobilised vital emergency supplies and ensured access to safe spaces for children and families. UNICEF has a huge humanitarian warehouse in Denmark, where supplies are ready to go in case of any emergency.

Among the sad stories, there have been stories of resilience and hope. A new-born baby was rescued and is being cared for in hospital. Whole families have escaped from the rubble. And one young girl was exceptionally brave and kept her brother safe, protecting him from dust and rubble until they were rescued.

On Friday 10th February, all Brindishe Schools held a bucket collection on the school gates. We were overwhelmed by your generous donations. This term, assemblies will focus on the disaster with all children, in an age appropriate manner and we will hold fund raising events to add to our already healthy collection from Brindishe Schools. WhatsApp





You must be at least 16 years old to register for and use WhatsApp. WhatsApp is a free messaging app that allows you to send messages, voice notes, photos and videos.

What are the features of WhatsApp?

Group chats: One of the key features is the group chat function. Everybody in the group, even if they are not one of your child's phone contacts, will be able to see all messages within that group. If your child is added to a group with someone that they have previously blocked, that person can still see their messages and send them messages within the group chat.

In settings, you can change who can add your child to groups, for example, you can change it to 'my contacts', which means that only those in your child's contacts can add them to a group. You can leave a group chat at any point so talk to your child and encourage them to leave any chat that makes them feel uncomfortable. You can leave groups silently (only the admin will be notified).

Location sharing: you can share your location on WhatsApp. Talk to your child about when this would be appropriate to use but also the potential danger of sharing their location, for example with strangers.

Blocking/Reporting: Show your child how to block and report.

Online Bullying: WhatsApp has been used in instances of online bullying, e.g. to send nasty messages or share images of other children without their permission. It is important to have regular chats with your child about their online life and that they understand that they must talk to you or another trusted adult if they are being bullied. Disappearing messages: With disappearing messages, you can control how long a message can be seen for before it is deleted – 24 hours, 7 days or 90 days (once set, this will only work for new messages).

View once messages: when sending a photo or video, you can set it so it can only be viewed once by respondents. **Screenshots are also blocked when using this function.**

Choose who can see your profile pic and when you're online: In settings (privacy), you can choose who can and can't see when you're online and your profile pic. You can choose either Everyone, My Contacts, My Contacts except and nobody.

Apply for a <u>National Lottery grant here.</u> Deadline: Ongoing. You must apply at least 12 weeks before your event, for example, if you are planning an event for 6 May, your deadline will be 25 February.

If you want to host a street party, you don't need any special permission or insurance, but you will need to apply for a road closure:

Apply for a street party road closure.
